REFLECTIONS... Taking Time out to Hear the Lord out of Nature and Scripture...



In April, Veronica, with others, travelled to the Dominican Republic to attend the International Women's Conference. I arranged for our regular house-sitter to move in, packed my basics and my boots, pack and gear, and headed for isolation [I really do not, and never have, like cities...] with my NIV and JB Bibles, the text of Benedict's 'Spe Salvi' on my laptop, and an absolute minimum of food based on three quick meal packs of macaroni and cheese, two medium cans of baked beans and one small can of rice dessert. All, except the macaroni, easy to

eat cold, which I did. Reminded me of my days in the NZ Army!

Physically my intention was to get a couple of vigorous work-outs before the mountains get snowed and specialised gear is needed, and Spiritually to take a slow meander through the richness of 'Spe Salvi' which had really spoken to me when released in 2007. Physically all went well. I did two great workouts, the first being six hours over a summit I know well but searching for 'suspected access' to a long ridge leading to a peak I want to consider in winter. I did find the link to the ridge but just twenty minutes inside my safe turnaround time but I was disappointed with the altitude you need to drop to safely access it. Ah well, that is for another day for Clarice and Nathaniel [my grandkids] and me. The second outings was a delightful twelve to fourteen kilometres return with a vertical gain of a modest thousand metres. Wonderful views. These are times I enjoy and with times of rich 'chatting with the Lord.'

The surprise of my eight days was in my spiritual reflection. I didn't even attempt to re-read 'Spe Salvi' as I was drawn early to Ecclesiasticus Chapter 2 in my old Jerusalem Bible. This brought back so many memories in a life which has had its fair share of challenges! Yet I am still able to function [...let us fall into the hands of the Lord, not into the hands of men...]. My Bible shows I marked this Scripture at the Sword of the Spirit Assembly in 1998 in Glasgow, and that Bayardo Reyes, a coordinator from Nicaragua had prayed this Scripture over me with a translator present. What Bayardo did not recall was that we had met a few years earlier and at a prayer meeting he had also prayed that Scripture over me. Interesting stuff as I do not speak Spanish, and Bayardo spoke no English. And then over a year ago my brother Bruce Yocum spoke to me out of the same Scriptural base as I slowly lifted out of a hard year or so from the devastation of the earthquakes, significant surgery and other challenges including a six month slide into a time of depression.

It was a sobering but encouraging time for me. I love the mountains and the isolation they offer, and I love the Scriptures and how they speak to me and affirm that 'God is the foundation of hope: not any god, but the God who has a human face and who has loved us to the end, each of us.....' Spe Salvi [Hope: 2007].

Ecclesiasticus 2:1-18: *My son, if you aspire to serve the Lord, prepare yourself for an ordeal. Be sincere of heart, be steadfast, and do not be alarmed when disaster comes. Cling to him and do not leave him, so that you may be honoured at the end of your days. Whatever happens to you, accept it, and in the uncertainties of your humble state, be patient, since gold is tested in the fire, and chosen men in the furnace of humiliation. Trust him and he will uphold you, follow a straight path and hope in him. You who fear the Lord, wait for his mercy; do not turn aside in case you fall. You who fear the Lord, trust him, and you will not be baulked of your reward. You who fear the Lord, hope for those good things, for everlasting happiness and mercy...Those who fear the Lord do not disdain his words, and those who love him keep his ways. Those who fear the Lord do their best to please him, and those who love him find satisfaction in his Law. Those who fear the Lord keep their hearts prepared and humble themselves in his presence. Let us fall into the hands of the Lord, not into the hands of men; for as his majesty is, so too is his mercy.*

NEWS AND ARTICLES

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S CONFERENCE, DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

On the 8th of April, Maureen Lowe [Auckland], Mhel Caballes [Wellington] and Kirsten Challies [Christchurch] and I set off on a very long journey via Los Angeles, and then Miami, to Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic. We went to attend the Sword of the Spirit International Women's Conference hosted by the Cuerpo de Christo [Body of Christ] Community, and entitled 'Arise! Shine Out'. The journey took two days so on arrival in Santo Domingo we were hungry, hot and very tired. I would like to share some of the highlights that I experienced.

I found all of the meditation talks, the teachings and the workshops I attended very inspiring. I felt the Lord reminding me once again why he had called me into the Lamb of God and that our work is not finished until we are called home to join Him. I was reminded that we are called to build a bulwark to defend against the onslaught of the enemy. The prophetic word also spoke of a 'tsunami of grace and mercy' to help us in our endeavours to reach out to all who come and respond.

I felt so blessed when all the more than 230 sisters came together for worship that we sang in our own languages. It sounded like a preview of what worship in Heaven will sound like. We were called as God's women to open wide our hearts in love to all whom the Lord sends. Another enjoyable experience was to take a tour around the Old Colonial City Centre and visit the museums and places of significant historical interest. I enjoyed the tour as I had just finished reading of the history of Hispaniola back home in Christchurch. Good timing!

On our way home we visited with our good friend Agnes [Gutierrez] and Ellen from the Los Angeles Community 'The City on the Hill.' We had a wonderful day of fellowship and sightseeing and for me the highlight was a visit to the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels. We felt truly blessed to have spent time with these two lovely sisters.

I finish with a word the Lord addressed to us at the Conference. It was "the Lord looks at us, his women, and see us all as beautiful, standing straight, strong and full of strength. The Lord makes us strong. We are a strong army but also a beautiful army.' And were also reminded that we were born for a time such as this.

He is faithful giving us treats along the way like: sitting beside and meeting the famous rock band Earth, Wind and Fire at Miami airport, seeing the famous places in LA in one day and in the midst of bomb scare and tight security at the airport, God did not let us go thru all

the hassle but treated us like elite Koru member with first class service from Air New Zealand crew. God is good!

There is so much of knowledge given to us at the conference and many beautiful moments of praise and worship. Mike Shaughnessy said in one of his talks "Community is not for you, you are here to build a community for the younger generation." I was once a youth of the community, my leaders inspired me and trained me to follow the Lord and embrace the community. Now as Mike said it is our turn to inspire our youth to embrace the community way of life. Putting in mind always that we are building this community not for ourselves but for our children. Therefore our task is to lay the foundation so that our children will not going to have a hard time continuing on our way of life when their time comes.

Another highlight for me, was the prophecy given at the prayer meeting, its about the second call of the Lord. It says there is a second calling, will you be ready to answer it. When God calls me to follow him, I was 18 years old, wearing a coloured sunglasses, I



do not know the price to pay as His follower, now more than 20 years, I know now the cost, the sacrifices, the challenges of being a disciple. That night I saw his face as if he was talking to me thru the prophecy, am I willing to answer his second call. Am I willing to help build this community for the next generation knowing that the battle ahead is harder than the first. I feel that its not just for me and my family, its for all of us. If you feel that you have given your share and its time to retire from serving God, think again, the battle is not over yet.

The whole experience gave me a new lease in life. I feel refreshed and it gave me a new meaning in my service. Thank you to the national coordinators for allowing us to represent you in that conference. I look forward to sharing them locally and would encourage others, including myself, to try to set aside time in your yearly planner to take yourself off to spend time alone with Him and be refreshed, thus investing in our greatest asset, being our faith.

The Theme for the Conference was " Arise! Shine Out! Isa 60:1". This was a challenge for me to Arise and Shine Out. In my own personal walk with the Lord it did give me

comfort to know that sister's just like me all over the world were called by God for a purpose to shine out to others and be HIS reflection. In one of our session Mike spoke about our calling to raise up new generations and to prepare and train them for the future growth of our community and to sustain it. Our future community is our children. We have to pass on the baton to the next generation. It was a whole day tour to Santa Monica, Hollywood, Beverly Hills, Walk with the Stars and the highest standard of fashion and Jewellery district. The Visit to the cathedral was also another spiritual experience for me, the icing on the cake.

To travel with Veronica, Mhel and Kirsten was such a blessing as I truly got to spend quality time with each of them and know that these memories will be forever special in my heart as we together Arise!! and Shine Out joyfully in HIS service.

LEADERSHIP PROFILE - MEET KAREN GEELEN

I was born in New Zealand in 1949, the younger of two girls, to an Irish mother and English/French father. Both of their parents immigrated to New Zealand after the First World War and settled in the Bay of Plenty. They were regular church goers and met at Tauranga Baptist church where they were later married - my father being the choirmaster there. As a child I attended ballet and tap dancing, swimming, tennis, speech and drama lessons. In my mid-teens our family shifted to Auckland so that my father could further his musical studies. After leaving school I trained at Business College as a shorthand typist. However, my parents separated and so I moved into the Baptist Youth hostel where I met Andre who was

attending Auckland University at the time.

In 1972 Andre and I were married and a year later our first child, Stefan, was born. We shifted to Nelson due to a job change for Andre and it was there Dascha, Johann and Katrinka were born. While there we were involved in the ecumenical prayer group scene and with the folk who began the Light of Christ Community. This was a special time for me as I experienced the healing love of brothers and sisters in the Lord. I also picked up my musical skills again learning to play the guitar.



In 1980 Andre had another job change which brought us to Napier. It was here our 5th child Nicholas was born. Again we connected with the local prayer group scene and helped form the Hawkes Bay Covenant Community which later joined the Lamb of God



becoming the Hawkes Bay Branch. Besides being in leadership in Lamb of God, I am involved in the music team for Dove, sing in the Civic Choir, teach Bible in Schools at the local primary school, attend a weekly music lesson and clean at Andre's work. CHALLENGES IN LIVING TOGETHER AS COMMUNITY

Resource for House Group Discussion by Tom Caballes

Growing Up in Maturity

May 2013

This is to continue until all of us are united in our faith and in our knowledge about God's Son, until we become mature, until we measure up to Christ, who is the standard. [Ephesians 4:13]

Probably all of us have experienced “growing pains.” But I remember too, when I was younger, my parents and other people tell me to “grow up.” What they are meaning is for me to act my age, and not be childish. Because of the ‘flesh,’ it is more ‘natural,’ convenient and easier to be immature and irresponsible. In the Christian life, God desires us to “grow up” as well and not be childish in our behaviour. Our goal is to be like Christ in our character. In our Christian walk, it is much easier to be childish too – lazy, irresponsible and selfish. Do people around us – families, friends, brothers and sisters – see Jesus in us?

So How Do We Grow Up to Become More Christ-Like?

1. We need to desire to grow in maturity. We need to take stock of where we are in different facets of our lives and see where there are discrepancies in our attitudes [selfishness, pride, anger, etc.] and behaviour to that of what we are supposed to be.
2. Face challenges and difficulties in a mature way. Ordeals can make us grow – but only if we have the right perspective about it. It can also bring us down if we allow it to do so by acting in an immature way. We need to identify the areas where we can grow as we face those trials in life. We can ask: what is the loving thing to do?
3. As we face different situations in life, we can ask: what is the mature way of responding or reacting to the situation? How would Jesus react? We can also try to see the opposite – the immature way of reacting – and decide not to do it. We need to decide to do the right thing.
4. We need to let go of childish and immature way of behaving and reacting. If we see people doing well and prospering, we need to be happy for them and avoid that question – what about me? *When I was a child, I spoke like a child, thought like a child, and reasoned like a child. When I became an adult, I no longer used childish ways. [1 Corinthians 13:11]*
5. We need to learn habits that lead to Christian maturity. How? By immersing ourselves in daily prayer and with God's Word; by building relationships with people who are also becoming like Jesus; and by surrendering our childish or ‘adolescent,’ selfish hearts and minds to God.
6. Lastly, we need to be patient with ourselves. The goal of being Christ-like will take a lifetime. Little by little, everyday...until people can see Jesus in us.

Other Scripture References

1. *Endure until your testing is over. Then you will be mature and complete, and you won't need anything. [James 1:4]*
2. *Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ. [Colossians 1:28]*
3. *Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ... [Ephesians 4:15]*
4. Other Scripture references: **Ephesians 4:22-24; Colossians 3:9-10; 1 Cor 14:20.**

For Personal Reflection and Group Sharing:

1. In my walk with God, do I try to grow up to be more like Him every day?
2. Where and when do I tend to act childishly? Where are my weak points? How to I grow and overcome them? Who can help me overcome them?

PRAYERWATCH - SOLDIERS OF CHRIST, ARISE **Fight the good fight**

Reinforce the guard, station the watchmen, prepare an ambush! The Lord will carry out his purpose... Jeremiah 51: 12 NIV

Praise is adoration, worship, a humble declaration of the goodness of God, a loving Father who wants the best for us. God has called each one of us to be on his side, a side that is certain of victory as Jesus death on the cross and his resurrection from the dead has won the total victory of God Kingdom. Praise should be a part of our preparation as we enter into battle especially as we stand in the gap as we serve our time on the Prayerwatch. 2 Chronicles 20: 1-30, shows how King Jehoshaphat and the people of Judah were surrounded by enemy armies and their response was first to call on the Lord God for mercy, help and deliverance. They prayed and fasted, reminding God of his past goodness to them and his promises for the future.
