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REFLECTIONS... 'What do I wear to church...'

In May Veronica and I gave part two of a special 'Foundations for Fiji Course' which was designed for mainly the leaders of the various Lamb of God groups now established in Nadi, Lautoka, Ba, Tavua and RakiRaki on the island of Viti Levu. The course was designed to get us to a place of receiving participants into a basic underway commitment status, thus identifying a 'core group of members' with and through whom we will build community.



The main group, although not necessarily the largest group, is located in Nadi and is under the leadership of Pastor Timoci Tuivita and his wife Salaseini. Timoci has always had a vision for the work of community building to extend throughout Fiji, and particularly the main island of Viti Levu, and since the beginning of our relationship he has set to work in encouraging satellite works in these other locations. Our community building decision is we simply do not have the resource to build in all of these locations and so we are looking to 'build leadership' in Nadi and through that leadership to serve and build the other locations. The current potential is something in the region of a hundred adults, and every single one is a Protestant/Pentecostal [yes- I know you can argue my terminology]. An obvious challenge is we are about building Christian Community, not local churches. Interestingly the challenge of the 'open door' prophecies came as the work in Nadi was just beginning and I for one cannot dismiss there is a linking of God.

My endeavours have been to try to discern the 'church/community' question and at this point I have concluded we are certainly building a community. Pastor Timoci himself is clear in the distinction and as I sit with him and the other leaders I hear the same concerns that we have regarding societal slide, regarding the need to win the next generation for the Lord, the need to encourage and strengthen family life, and the need for structured teaching to strengthen family life, and more. The four main leaders [all

pastors in their own right- see photograph] say back to me the same thing- they are hearing a style and content of teaching that Fiji needs, a content not handled from church pulpits. They are in fact receiving our teachings from the Sword of the Spirit. BUT I see and sense a difference. In my opinion if we are to embrace this work as embracing the words of the 'open door' then we must also adjust our expectations of the end result. I do not think we can build 'community as

we know it' with all of our currently understood structures of regular general gatherings with all the whistles and bells, house groups three weeks a month, Kairos conferences here and there and everywhere, significant incomes from tithes, special formation courses one after the other, and the other things we do. WHY? Because this door opens into a socio-economic environment of challenge, not of plenty. In the hundred adults and families we can reach - how many own a vehicle? None. How many even own a push-bike? None. How many have regular work? Few. How many would earn more than F\$5.00 an hour? You're joking, right? But these folk love God and have a basic level of reliance deeper than much of what I see here in New Zealand.

Yet talk about loving your children, talk about putting your very best clothes reserved for church, talk about worrying about how your children will grow up, talk about longing to access good teaching and having pastoral care and a men's group - then you see the same desire as that of my heart, excepting that I don't reserve my best clothing every week for church! Veronica and I were privileged to receive five married couples, including the four pastors, and a number of singles into initial underway during this trip. We now have that necessary 'core' identified. There are now two 'core' families in Lautoka and Ba, and three families and three singles in Nadi. The Sunday Gathering in Nadi was immediately different. It was smaller but based around the 'core' and it was vibrant and focussed as never before. We are on the way.

Let me conclude with raiding from Timoci something I heard him say over a year ago. It went like this: *'If you are in the United States or New Zealand or parts of Europe and you get into trouble, you can dial on your phone 999, or 111, but here in Fiji that's a waste of time. Here you call JER333 and God answers and says 'Call ME and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know.'* **[Jeremiah 33:3]**

NEWS FROM LOCATIONS IN THE SOUTH ISLAND BRANCH

Lamb of God Centre Earthquake Damage Update

The Lamb of God Centre Main Hall is now demolished and we are entering the next phase of Centre restoration in three phases. Starting in the next month or so the Main Auditorium and associated areas will be 'gutted' then strengthened and repaired to 72% compliant with the revised Earthquake Code, up from the currently designated 8% [that is why we were shut down]. Following this the Cottage/Office area will be repaired, including some foundational work. Then the final stage will be a Main Hall rebuild. We are in discussion to configure the hall differently and to have it incorporate two toilets, including disability facility, two new offices [plus retaining the two in the lounge area], a kitchen with servery access into the auditorium and into a new Hall/Lounge which will seat up to forty in a cafeteria style design. Not all work is covered in our insurance policy and so the Lamb of God will need make a contribution into costs. However we are developing a facility management and hire plan which will ensure longer term self-funding of the Lamb of God Centre.



The construction company given the contract is in final stages for permits and they asked if we could strip out and store offsite much of the moveable materials inside. We had a great working-bee team attend to this a few weeks ago. As you can see in the photograph we had some pretty tough teenage girls [Grace, Analise and Sophie] into the action. This was my sixth Men's conference and each year the elders have consistently raised the bar. However, when I saw the theme "Called to be Saints Missionaries & Martyrs," I thought maybe the bar this year was raised too high for most of us mortals – definitely for me anyway. To me - Saints Missionaries & Martyrs were heroes from elsewhere – not from the real world in which we live in. How wrong I was proved over these 3 days.

This was the first 3 day Conference I attended, and we assembled on Friday evening. After praise and worship, we watched a movie "Of Gods and Men". By Saturday morning we were close to 50 brothers and ready with sessions of praise and worship, 3 talks, plenty of time for personal reflection and group discussions on each of the talks, celebration of the Lord's Day and a ministry session later that night.

The First of the Talks was by Harry Lowe on "Our Call to be Saints". The key Focus was on: 1) What does it mean to be saints? 2) Obstacles we face & how to confront them. 3)

Our Response – our challenge to this call to be saints. In Talk 2 “Our Call to be Missionaries,” we learned that when we are called to be saints - every saint in the making is also a missionary. John Tham explained that the primary duty of a missionary is to evangelize, and to raise up disciples for the Kingdom. The challenge is for us to take the good news to people outside the boundary of the community. Most encouraging was the example of a brother, (Viren Gupta, present at the conference) who was befriended by the Community and invited to a men’s conference a few years ago. Viren recently converted to Christianity and has now integrated into our Community. Allen Carneiro delivered talk 3 on “Our Call to be Martyrs.” The challenge for us was: “Can you be a faithful Christian and not be willing to die for Christ?”

The Lord’s Day meal was eagerly anticipated with everyone dressed in their Sunday best. Later that night Dominic D’Sa & Ronnie D’Souza conducted the Ministry time and as so often happens, this turned to be the highlight of the Conference with a time of reflection and inner healing.

The next morning, Greg Hall spoke about “Our Community, the Lamb of God”. He recapped who we are and reminded us of Our Purpose and Mission. The Conference ended with soul stirring and uplifting testimonies followed by Mass.



On each of the three days, we celebrated birthdays of different brothers – a 76 year old, a 67 year old and hold your breath - a 21 year old!!! To see a young man decide to celebrate his 21st birthday weekend at this conference was edifying to all who attended. This was the first Men’s conference at Willow Park and the venue was simply brilliant, with all us being really fussed over and well taken care of with sumptuous food and awesome desserts. If this is what it takes to becoming Saints, Missionaries & Martyrs, then – bring it on!!!

Developing Compassion for Others

June 2013

Finally, everyone must live in harmony, be sympathetic, love each other, have compassion, and be humble. [1 Peter 3:8]

Compassion is defined as “a feeling of deep sympathy and sorrow for another who is stricken by misfortune, accompanied by a strong desire to alleviate the suffering.” Synonyms include sympathy, kind-heartedness, mercy and benevolence. When Jesus died for us, He was full of compassion for us, knowing that we cannot rescue ourselves from our sinfulness. But that was a tremendous price He paid for His compassion for us – with His own life! As Jesus’ disciples, do we imitate Him and show compassion to those who are suffering around us?

So How Do We Develop Compassion for Others?

1. It is easy for us to judge those who are in misery; that it is their own fault for being in such a situation. But God does not want us to judge; He wants us to love and show compassion. We may need to talk with them about changes needed to be done in their lives so they will stop suffering. Again, all these needs to be done in love. So, love others, not judge them.
2. To truly develop compassion for others, we need to imagine and go into the shoes of those who are in anguish. If you were in their shoes, ask: How would you feel and think? What help do you need? What is your hope and your future?
3. Pray and intercede for them. There are many times we cannot do anything to help the person, but can certainly God can do something about it. But if we can do something, then...act!
4. Act. Our feeling of sympathy should move us to act for the good of those who are less fortunate. This may mean talking with the person, encouraging him or her, or doing something in concrete to help the person. A person in grief appreciates a shoulder to cry on and someone to hug and show love to him or her.
5. We need to show compassion to those who are physically suffering – but also to those who are spiritually suffering – those who do not know God and are living a life not in accord with God. Romans 6:23 says, “*The wages of sin is death.*” Imagine just how much misery they experience because of their alienation with God. We need to reach out to them with kind-heartedness, not with judgment and condemnation. What they need to see is the 5th gospel in us.
6. “*Let my heart be broken with the things that break the heart of God.*” [Robert Pierce, founder of World Vision.] When we see those who are suffering in God’s eyes, and then moves us to pray and act, we then move closer to the very heart of God’s love and compassion.

Other Scripture References

1. *Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy. [Matthew 5:7]*
2. *Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience... [Colossians 3:12]*
3. *And have mercy on those who doubt; save others by snatching them out of the fire; to others show mercy with fear... [Jude 1:22-23]*
4. Other Scripture references: **Romans 11:30-32; Psalm 77:9; Luke 10: 36-37.**

For Personal Reflection and Group Sharing:

1. How easy is it for me to judge and shun those who are in pain and in misery? Do I really think about them and care for them?
2. Is my heart attuned to God’s heart about compassion? Do I look to those who are suffering with the eyes of God?
